

FACULTY QUALIFICATIONS FOR OCCUPATIONAL PROGRAMS

<i>Instructional Area:</i>	504 Criminal Justice and Law Enforcement
<i>Educational Requirements:</i>	Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice or a closely related field is required. Master's degree in Criminal Justice is preferred. In evaluating candidates for this position, Nicolet may consider a combination of education, training, and experience that provides the necessary knowledge, skills, and abilities to perform the duties of the position.
<i>Occupational Requirements:</i>	An occupational instructor shall have two years (4,000 hours) of verifiable occupational work experience as a fully qualified worker in each law enforcement/corrections area. Occupational experience must include one year (2,000 hours) within the past five years. Recent teaching experience in post-secondary higher education may be substituted for up to one year of the occupational experience requirement.

<i>Requirements from other governmental agencies, associations, or other significant groups:</i>	An attorney licensed by the Wisconsin State Bar Association and/or who is credentialed by the Law Enforcement Standards Board (LESB) may teach Constitutional Law, Criminal Law, and Juvenile Law courses.
