

ART & DESIGN PRINCIPLES THROUGH BASIC PAINTING & COLLAGE

Discover or refresh your knowledge of the principles of art and design. Many people with artistic talent struggle to feel confident when creating their own designs because they lack formal training. Sarah has created a way to break down the principles and elements into a two-day class so you can walk away feeling confident. If you have begun your art exploration without learning these principles, making beautifully composed works of art will be much easier and more pleasurable. If you need a recap and some practice using these principles, this is a perfect way to jumpstart your creative juices. These principles span all mediums including watercolor, oil, acrylic, collage, sculpture, pottery, assemblage, and jewelry making.

Join artist Jes Zange for a workshop featuring her nothing goes to waste method. This workshop will focus on using fabric scraps and found materials to create small abstract fabric textile pieces. Jes will also discuss her journey from creating art for others to developing her own style and process.

Jes Zange is an emerging artist living in Brookfield, WI. Being inspired by creatives her whole life, she decided to pursue a degree in fine art and received her BFA in Studio Art from Millikin University in 2009 with an emphasis on painting, drawing, and printmaking. Since then she honed in on her craft and established herself as an original textile artist, producing pieces for clients around the world. She uses natural materials purchased from small

Oral histories are essential to community record keeping, but are often a lost art in today's busy world. Join this introductory session to learn how to construct an oral history project, create timelines, and begin your own small archive. Petri will share her personal experiences while working on her book, "With Harp and Sword in Hand: Telling Black Women's Stories."

Rosy Petri is a mother, artist, and storyteller from Milwaukee, WI. In 2021, Petri served as the inaugural Artist in Residence at the

Bell Hooks Center at Berea College. In 2020, she was selected as a Mary L. Nohl Emerging Artist Fellow and a Mildred L. Harpole Artist of the Year by the City of Milwaukee Arts Board. In 2019, as the 11th Pfister Artist in Residence, Petri created a space to showcase her fabric portraits, record podcast interviews, and celebrate traditions of the African diaspora. Petri was a Milwaukee Artist Resource Network mentee under artist Della Wells. Petri's work can be viewed in several prominent Milwaukee locations, including the Pfister Hotel, where Shavonda's Bridal High Tea, a legacy piece, commemorates her residency; Northwestern Mutual's Giving Gallery, where her gestural portrait series Together is featured; and at the Milwaukee County Courthouse, where her MKE WI series is installed outside the county executive's office. 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GET YOUR BRAIN ON YOUR SIDE

Learn how to make the most of neuroplasticity, which is your brain's ability to grow and change throughout your life. This is not a course in "brain games." Instead, you'll get a grounding in the fundamental principles behind developing a better brain, and then we'll dive into some specifics. You'll learn the mechanics of willpower and how to get more of it, and how to use the power of habit to make every day a little easier. You'll learn how (and why) to talk back to your negative self-talk and how to manage negative emotions. We'll dig into the surprising cognitive edge you get by being in a positive mood. We also look at how generosity makes you a little smarter, and we explore the mysteries of sleep, hydration, and exercise and their impact on our ability to think straight.



A decade ago, **Molly Rose Teuke** overcame a lifelong fear of public speaking, and now calmly delivers keynotes and other public addresses. The next step was to tame her fear of microphones; she now produces and hosts a weekly classical music show on WXPR local public radio. She is a coach in private practice, credentialed by the International Coaching Federation and certified by the NeuroLeadership Institute (NLI) as a brain-based coach. Pre-Covid, Molly Rose facilitated brain-based leadership training for NLI. She is inspired by an abiding curiosity about how our brains work, speaks and writes on diverse aspects of Getting Your Brain on Your Side, and is a long-time instructor for Nicolet's Community Ed program. She holds an MA in communications from Ohio University and a BA in journalism from UW-Madison.

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EASY PEASY SOLAR DYEING WITH WOOL AND

KITCHEN WASTE Wirtual

As a busy farmer, Jane was thrilled to discover solar dyeing and the flexibility of timing it allows while still giving stunning color results. No matter where you live, everyone has plants nearby that can provide color. Join Jane for a hands-on session to learn some simple techniques to collect materials, prepare wool, apply mordant, and turn kitchen waste materials and foraged plants into lovely natural colors on wool yarn and roving. You will see several examples of in progress dye jars and naturally dyed yarns and roving, and each of you will prepare jars for tending, observation, and completion at home.

Jane Hansen has had a passion for knitting her entire life. She has at least one knitting project going at any time – could be wool, cotton, silk, or even bamboo. In 2000 she moved to Price County, WI, with her husband, dog, and cat to embark on an adventure in sustainable living. They began with a market garden and soap making, continued with chickens, and eventually moved to lambs. Autumn Larch Farm LLC is very small and diverse with a primary focus on fiber. She now grows plants for dyeing as well as raising sheep for wool. Jane is a member of the Three Rivers Fibershed. Jane has her yarn and roving milled locally and she also makes handcrafted soap (felted and not), dryer balls, and felted handbags.

For thousands of years, people have turned to mending to extend the functionality and life of their textiles. That tradition continues today with a call to action to care for your clothing and keep textiles out of the landfill and in your closet. We'll talk through picking the right mend for your project, techniques for repair, what supplies you'll need, and how to feel confident taking on whatever your closet throws at you. Grab items that need some love and learn how to mend your woven and knit fabrics by hand.

Maddy Bartsch is an artist, educator, and organizer of decentralized textile economies based in Minneapolis, MN. She is a co-founder and co-president of the Three Rivers Fibershed. Maddy's previous experience includes project management for the Minnesota Hemp Wool Project and the Three Rivers Fibershed Regional



Fiber Sourcebook, as a research assistant for the National Mill Inventory Survey, as a Farm Educator at Gale Woods Farm, and as a Yarn Incubator. Maddy recently began a plant-based dye business, Salt of the North Dyes, to provide accessible local color to all. Maddy speaks on the topic of local fiber systems and sustainable textiles and teaches fiber arts classes to learners of all ages throughout the Midwest. She can be found most summer days in her gardens tending to her dye plants.

MIXED MEDIA PRINTMAKING

Have you always been intrigued by intaglio printmaking, but thought it would be too complicated? Then this is the class for you! In it, we'll learn how to create small prints using dry point (a technique without chemicals) and monoprints. It's a very simple technique that yields AMAZING results! The \$10 supply fee includes everything you'll need, so all you have to bring is yourself and your imagination. This is a class for ALL skill levels – no drawing experience necessary.

Mel Kolstad is an artist, speaker, instructor, and arts advocate who makes her home in Fond du Lac, Wl. She is a printmaker, collagist, and papermaker, specializing in large series of tiny art. Mel has participated in many artist residencies throughout Wisconsin and also teaches various classes around the state, and has exhibited in many solo exhibits in the Fox Cities and Northern Wisconsin. 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A FIELD GUIDE TO THE IMAGINATION

In this course, artist and illustrator Julie Benda will teach the basics of block print design, carving, and image transfer through the portable, accessible, and attractive method of rubber stamping.

The class will cover techniques used for multi-color printing, texture, and repetition, as well as get you familiar with tools of the trade. Materials will be provided for everything you need to carve and print your first, (second, and third!) stamp. All you'll need to start is an eraser, pencil, and your highly creative mind.

For thematic purposes, each student is encouraged to bring in natural objects such as leaves, sticks, seeds, flowers, etc. The class will focus on the surprising patterns and shapes that are found in our environment and we'll use these items as a starting point for your "field guide". As we go through the process of sketching, carving stamps, creating patterns, and layering, we'll also investigate what



narratives accompany the images we're creating, and you'll have time to do a little writing as well!

The \$20 supply fee includes paper and several blocks of rubber for carved stamps. Gouges, ink, rollers, and ink pads will also be provided for the duration of the workshop. Students are encouraged to bring blank card stock or other materials they wish to print on. Small journals will be available for you to take home for an extra \$10.

Julie Reneé Benda is a printmaker, wood sculptor, and storyteller. Her work spans from satirical cartooning to public engagement, woodcarving, drawing, and illustration. Benda earned her BA in biological studies and fine art at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point and her MFA at the Minneapolis College of Art and Design. She works at the intersection of art and the environment, with an emphasis on communicating and understanding relationships between plant and human worlds. Her work has been featured in Hyperallergic, MakeMN Magazine, and McSweeney's Internet Tendency.

PANDEMIC GRIEF: A WORKSHOP FOR PROCESSING AND HEALING

The global pandemic has presented us with what grief support specialists call "a grief experience beyond the norm." The expressions of the unresolved pain of loss is now showing itself in our society as heightened levels of anger, violence and unrest, survivor's guilt, and a rising number of deaths by suicide, drug overdose, and more.

Grief experiences beyond the norm make grieving harder than usual because sometimes we're not sure what we're grieving or if it's okay to feel the loss we're feeling. Even when we know what we're grieving and feeling, we might have little or no idea how to forge a path toward healing.

The first hour-long morning event will include exploring the four types of grief identified as beyond the norm. The second hour-long workshop will include learning the technique of

pot-breaking to express, explore, and begin the grief healing process.

The afternoon two-hour renewal and resilience-building workshop will include guided meditation, stress and grief resilience-building exercises, as well as writing and discussion.

Come share your wishes for greater peace for yourself, your community, and the world by creating a personal peace pole! A peace pole is a hand-crafted monument, colorfully painted with images and words that express a message of peace and hope. Peace poles can be found in gardens, as well as outside of homes, churches, and other buildings.



While traditionally made of wood and decorated with the phrase "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in four languages, in this workshop experience you will be free to use whatever words or materials and designs that best express your hope for greater peace for yourself, your community, and the world. No art experience required. All necessary supplies included.

Elizabeth Lewis is a grief support specialist, stress resilience trainer, motivational speaker, and spiritual counselor whose areas of expertise include trauma-healing, suicide prevention, forgiveness facilitation, and healing art and writing. Recognizing that there is no "one-size-fits-all" path to wellness and a sense of wholeness, Elizabeth has pursued extensive trainings and certifications in diverse approaches to resilience, spirituality, healing, and growth. Elizabeth also draws on her personal resilience and experience in overcoming trauma to help her clients and workshop participants find their own best path to wellness.

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INTUITIVE ENCAUSTIC PAINTING

Painting with the ancient, luminous medium of encaustic wax offers unlimited creative possibilities. Encaustic medium is a combination of beeswax and damar resin with pigment added to the medium for color. Encaustic painting is the process of applying the heated wax onto a substrate and fusing layers of wax with a heat gun or torch. You'll be introduced to the basics of encaustic painting including safety practices when working with hot wax, encaustic tools and materials, and various techniques for achieving lines, texture, layers, collage, and more. No previous experience with encaustic painting is necessary. You'll create at least two works of art during the workshop and leave with the confidence to continue the exploration of encaustic painting.



In her mid-40s, Kathleen M. Kvern began painting with serious intention because it's never too late to lean into your passion and away from fear and self-doubt. She creates layered encaustic, often with mixed media, inspired by the beauty of the natural world, complexity of her inner world, and mystery of the spiritual world. She has exhibited her work at local and regional galleries and teaches encaustic workshops. Her work can be purchased through her studio and viewed on her website.

Over the course of three months, we will use plants grown at the Northwoods Community Garden to learn about making natural dyes. We'll learn about making extractions from plants, dyeing on various types of fiber and cloth, as well as how to make lake pigments from exhausted dye vats to use for painting or as ink. There will be prepared dyeing cloth available to purchase and recipes for doing your own cloth preparation for future sessions, if you prefer. Sign up for one or all sessions.

Please note: No supply fee is included in initial cost, as participants can pay the instructor for prepared cloth or contact her ahead of time to learn what size/how to prepare their own fiber/cloth for dyeing.

After working with clay for more than 30 years, **Debra Jircik** has shifted her focus to fiber. She has been hand papermaking for more than 20 years, working with the medium in a variety of ways, and has been fortunate to study with generous teachers. She enjoys sharing art through teaching and organizing/working on collaborative community art projects and environmental installations. Her current creative practice reflects her interest in minimizing her environmental impact. Debra's most recent creative forays have been into natural dyeing and growing her own dye plants including Japanese indigo and eco-printing as they relate to her handmade paper.



Debra is raising Japanese indigo for her fifth year and was awarded a Surface Design Association Personal Development Grant to go to Japan in October 2017 to study Japanese indigo, seed to dye, in the context of Japanese textile tradition. She was a 2019 Artist in Residence at UW-Madison's Trout Lake Limnology station. Her Circle of Life Studio, where she also offers workshops and artist retreats/residencies, is in Eagle River, WI.

Join former U.S. National Park Service Ranger and tracker Aimee Heavey on a three-hour winter adventure. We'll begin indoors, with some secret tricks-of-the-trade to expand your awareness, even in the silence of winter snows. Uncover hidden



stories by exploring the woods, lake edge, and other points of interest at Nicolet College. Includes awareness skills, tracking, and winter tree and plant identification.

Join homesteaders and permaculture enthusiasts Mike Haasl and Aimee Heavey for a four-session workshop series that goes more in-depth about a number of permaculture principles and how to apply them to your personal property. In doing so, you'll learn how to take advantage of natural processes to enhance the form and function of your property.

Each class will begin with an overview of two different design elements and topics. We'll follow this with an open design forum where instructors guide and help you develop your site plan. Sign up for any or all of the classes in the series and continue your mapping progress throughout. Students will need to bring a map of their property, which is available at county courthouses or can be printed from home by using mytopo.com, Google Earth, or Google Maps. Students are also encouraged to bring along colored pencils or design markers, a ruler, and tracing paper.
