Talking about it is hard, but it's not just OK to talk, it's important for us elders to learn that youth are at risk. In fact, some victims feel trapped in their situations. We will learn about the specific risk factors in some youth, how sex and labor/job traffickers operate, and what resources are available locally and statewide to assist victims.

Learn about the Human Trafficking Hotline and other important issues around trafficking from Vilas County Detective Sergeant Emily Miller who has 15 years of experience in law enforcement and seven years as a detective.

Ced Vig 1 THE PELICAN RIVER FOREST PROJECT

Wednesday, September 17 | 10 am Nicolet College, Lakeside Center Theatre Instructors: Representative from The Conservation Fund, Oneida County Clear Water Association, Friend of the Pelican River Forest, and Others. Hybrid: In-person and Zoom

Just a few miles east of Rhinelander along Hwy 8 is a 70,000-acre block of forest, water, and wetlands that is protected forever from development and subdivision, safeguarding what was the largest privately-owned, unprotected block of forest remaining in the state. This is the Pelican River Forest, now owned by The Conservation Fund. We will learn about the varied ecosystems in this tract, from northern hardwood, red

pine, and aspen dominated forests to cedar swamps, and bogs, from whose groundwaters the Pelican River and Wolf River arise. We will be introduced to some of the iconic species of flora and fauna that flourish here. The long process that conserved these resources will be explained by several of the hundreds (maybe thousands) of groups and individuals who advocated for creating a working forest that supports forestry jobs, supports local economies through participation in the tax base, and is open to public recreation. Please join us to learn how this conservation project succeeded because of the skills and efforts of many working together.

Fifty million people in the USA have some degree of hearing loss. While this invisible disability affects people of all ages, it affects people of retirement age most. It often goes undiagnosed and/or untreated. The results can be traumatic, as they include cognitive decline, depression, and more. Join Julie Olson, a Rhinelander native with personal hearing loss, to hear about these ramifications and treatment options.

Julie Metternich Olson, a 'native Hodag', has lived in the Appleton, WI area since 1971. She has BS degrees in physical education, health, and public speaking and a MS degree in Community Human Services. She was diagnosed with progressive hearing loss at age 22. After teaching high school students for several years, she became involved in research, advocacy, and providing peer support for the hard of hearing population.

She has served as president of the national board of the Hearing Loss Association of America, Inc. (HLAA), and has participated on various governing boards and committees related to hearing loss. Her experiences have led to writing and publishing opportunities, most recently a book she and her granddaughter published about how hearing loss affects families. She is an experienced public speaker and volunteer. Julie credits the excellent teachers she had at Rhinelander High School for much of her success.

MIGIZIKWE (EAGLE WOMAN) SHARES HER JOURNEY

Mildred "Tinker" Schuman is an Ojibwe elder from the Lac du Flambeau Band of Lake Superior Chippewa of Northern Wisconsin; she is also known as Migizikwe - Eagle Woman. She is deeply respected within the Ojibwe Nation of Lac du Flambeau as a Woman Pipe Carrier, Sweat Lodge Leader, Ogichida Chidewegon (Big Drum) Jingle Dress Dancer, and ceremonial Sundancer and Moondancer, as well as a healer, a poet, and an artist.

Tinker Schuman is also a water walker. In recent years, she organized "Water Way Walks" to raise awareness of "Mother Earth's Life Blood – The Water" both for the Lac du Flambeau community and for the surrounding communities in Vilas County, Wisconsin. This region has one of the highest density of lakes in the world. She will share her story that led her on this journey.

Ced Vig 2 AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES IN ONEIDA COUNTY

Oneida County has 1,129 lakes covering 68,447 acres, and over 830 miles of streams. These water resources are a large part of our lifestyle, as well as our economy, and are threatened by the potential impact of aquatic invasive species. The introduction of a single AIS can negatively impact native habitats, ecosystems, fisheries, wildlife, recreational opportunities, waterfront property values, water-related business and industries, human health, and how we enjoy our time on the water.

Guided by Stephanie Boismenue, we will learn the extent and distribution of invasive species here in Oneida County as well as the programs the County sponsors through the Land and Water Conservation Department to help prevent and control the spread of aquatic invasives. These programs, plus actions by individuals like ourselves may even decrease the population density of some AIS and restore balance to ecosystems.

Stephanie is the Aquatic Invasive Species Coordinator and Conservation Technician for Oneida County. She is actively involved with monitoring and controlling AIS as well as outreach and educational programs in this field.

LEARN TO FLOOR CURL

Floor curling is a fun inclusive and low impact adaptation of traditional ice curling that can be played indoors on gym floors or other smooth surfaces. Players will slide their stones toward a target area known as the "house" aiming to get as close to the center (the button) as possible. Teams take turns delivering stones and can use strategy to block opponents or knock their stones away. It's accessible for all ages and abilities, with no special footwear needed. Unlike traditional curling, there is no sweeping and no ice. It promotes teamwork, communication and strategy.

Terri Gleason has curled since 1992 in state and national events. Terri has served on the US Curling Board of directors, president of Wisconsin State Curling Association from 2022-2024, and is currently US Women's Curling Association president 2024-2025.

Complex and the Wisconsin CCC Museum, as he brings to life the grit and determination of the young men who rebuilt our forests, battled wildfires, and helped bring America back from the brink of the Great Depression. Discover how their hard work not only transformed the Northwoods but left a lasting legacy still visible today. With a presentation full of amazing photos from the CCC camps around the Northwoods, it will open a window into the past, and into one of the most highly regarded federal programs in US history, the Civilian Conservation Corps.

Kerry Bloedorn is the director of Rhinelander's Pioneer Park Historical Complex, host of WJFW's, *Connecting the Dots* and WXPR's *Northwoods, Moment in History*. He also writes for *New North Magazine*.

WALKING 500 MILES ON THE CAMINO DE SANTIAGO

On September 2024, I departed St Jean Pied de Port, France, on foot, for a journey of 500 miles across Northern Spain to Santiago de Compostela, where St James the Apostle is believed to be entombed. The Camino de Santiago or "The Way of St James" is an ancient pilgrimage route that has been trekked since approximately 900 a.d. It is a region incredibly rich in culture and history.

Although I was traveling solo, I was rarely alone. The community of "pilgrims" from all over the world support each other on what can

occasionally be a difficult route. The relationships formed were the most rewarding part of the journey.

I will try to convey the depth of this experience, as I tell stories of my walk. Useful tips and resources for anyone interested in their own pilgrimage on "The Way of St James" will be provided.

During Prohibition and the Great Depression there was a rise in crime in cities like Chicago, Illinois and Saint Paul, Minnesota. Gangsters needed places to hide out when the pressure was on the cities to capture criminals and end the wave of crime. Saint Paul and Chicago criminals found respite in the isolated forests of northern Wisconsin. Many found the same pleasure in the north as the everyday tourists did. Local citizens befriended, guided, hunted, and helped hide them. Some locals became business partners in the bootleg liquor trade. Learn how local citizens got involved in the liquor trade and were able to supply bootleg alcohol to Chicago and Minneapolis. Join Kay Krans for the stories she has gathered.

Let's face it – most of us are closer to the exit than the entrance and have already experienced some differences in what we can and cannot do, both physically and mentally. There are many ways we might respond to these losses: with denial, trepidation, sadness, or even anger. Surely, there are also more positive and constructive ways that we could approach aging – if only we had a better understanding of what to expect and how to adapt. With a greater awareness of our changing capabilities that come with age, we can learn strategies to manage these changes. In this session (which we hope will be the first of several guided by your input, and interests, dear members!), Dr. Chris Koeppl will introduce us to some of the physical, cognitive, and psychological aspects of aging.
